## FYI:

- Anatomy and Physiology: This is under the Health section. You are required to complete 4 half courses under this and A & P must be completed. Some are 2 course credits- KNES 259 and 260 (so you will need 2 more health options) or just 1 course credit such as BIOL 305 (you will need 3 more health options.)
  - CORE 553: Health Foundations across the Life Span is mandatory for all distance students to take to meet the anatomy and physiology requirement for the BCR degree. This course is ONLY for distance students. No exceptions.
  - When you see a course listed in multiple sections that does not mean you can take that one course and it meets the requirements for all sections that it is listed under. We are listing where it can possibly go but the course can only be used once.
  - Academic Writing 303 is required for ALL students
  - All of our courses for each semester (fall, winter, spring/summer) are listed on our website under Courses in the grey menu (left side), along with course outlines so that you can be prepared for what is being offered each year.
  - If you need to withdraw from a course you must contact Sarah to do this.
- **CORE 323** has been created for students in Calgary (or studying in Calgary) who do not have a disability studies background in their diploma. Not sure if this is a required course for you? Check on our website under Student Tools and under the 323 section is a link of all of our approved diplomas and beside each one it states if 323 is needed or not.
- If you are a distance student, if you are completing the 4 year route such as a degree holder, coming from high school, change of program, or a related diploma (CORE 205 is equivalent to 323) you take CORE 569 or CORE 573 (Calgary students only) instead.
